ALCOHOL CAN HURT YOUR LOVED ONES

Excess drinking of alcohol is a key factor of many cases of Domestic Violence

Alcohol increases your aggression and affects your Judgement

When you drink you are more likely to:

- Physically, sexually, or emotionally abuse
- your partner
- Mistreat or abuse your children



ALCOHOL CAN DESTROY YOUR FAMILY

Alcohol abuse is one of the major causes of family breakdowns.

Excessive drinking can lead to:

- Financial money problems
- Violence and abuse
- Strained relationships
- Separation and divorce
- Employment problems because you are unfit
- to work
- Difficulty in completing jobs around your home
- or garden



EXCESSIVE ALCOHOL CAN KILL

Too much alcohol can have dangerous and even fatal effects on your health

- Kidney and liver damage •
- Brain damage

- High blood pressure •

Alcohol abuse is a major cause of premature death

To reduce your risks of alcohol death or disease, it is recommended that adults drink no more than two standard drink per day.



ALCOHOL PUTS YOU IN JAIL



Alcohol impairs your judgement making you do things you would not normally do.

- Anti social behaviour drunk and • disorderly,
